


What's more, in the midst of divisions we symbolize our unity through handshakes and hugs (Eph. 2:14-21).

Notes on Today's Music

¹**Jean Langlais** was born in La Fontenelle (Ille-et-Vilaine, Brittany), a small village near Mont Saint-Michel, France. Langlais became blind due to glaucoma when he was only two years old and was sent to the Institut National des Jeunes Aveugles (National Institute for Blind Children) in Paris, where he began to study the organ with André Marchal. From there, he progressed to the Paris Conservatoire, obtaining prizes in organ, which he studied with Marcel Dupré, composition, which he studied with Paul Dukas, and improvisation with Charles Tournemire. After graduating, he returned to the National Institute for Blind Children to teach, and also taught at the Schola Cantorum in Paris from 1961 to 1976. Many of his students went on to become important musicians, including organist and composer Naji Hakim.

It was as an organist, however, that Langlais made his name, following in the footsteps of César Franck and Tournemire as organiste titulaire at the Basilica of Sainte-Clotilde in Paris in 1945, a post in which he remained until 1988. He was much in demand as a concert organist, and toured widely across Europe and the United States. Outside music, Langlais was a colorful and charismatic character. He died in Paris aged 84, and was survived by his second wife, Marie-Louise Jaquet-Langlais, a monumental organist in her own right.

J. S. Bach's ²**Prelude and Fugue in D Major**, BWV 532, most probably from the early Weimar years, illustrates Bach's great interest in stylistic diversity. The Prelude is divided in three contrasting sections. The first, which serves as an introduction, draws on gestures found in the North-German Praeludium: bravura pedal and manual scales that puts fear in the nerves of most organists, extended pedal points with imitative entries, and an extended double trill. Such writing was intended to capture the attention of the listener. The more extended second section, in stricter rhythm, is a sprightly Italian instrumental movement. The third section, which serves as a conclusion, brings back the North-German idiom, this time in the guise of a dense, harmonically rich passage complete with double pedal.

The four-part Fugue is a spirited instrumental piece based on a twisty subject that requires virtuoso work in the pedals. Bach's initial concept of the movement (BWV 532/2a) was considerably shorter and less refined. In reworking the music, Bach increased the number of thematic entries, expanded the harmonic scheme, and refined the text here and there. The Fugue reaches a brilliant climax with an extended pedal cadenza, leading the scribe of one early manuscript copy of the work to warn the player, "Note well: in this piece one must really let the feet kick around a lot."

January 25: *Peru: Trek the Andes to Machu Picchu*

Travel 50 miles on foot past stunning snow-capped peaks and through luxuriant cloud forests. View glaciers and alpine lakes, and lesser known Inca sites tucked into the slopes. You'll see the dazzling 20,574-foot Salkantay, a sacred peak in Inca mythology. This travelogue shows the Inn-to-Inn trail from the Incan aqueduct at Soraypampa (near Cusco) up to the Salkantay pass at 15,213 feet, hiking the girth of Humantay Mountain, through cloud forests and coffee plantations to finally reach Aguas Calientes, the gateway to Machu Picchu.
