



Notes on Today's Music

†**Herbert Howells** started his musical career as a cathedral organist. He succeeded Gustav Holst as director of music at St. Paul's Girls' School in London and taught composition for many years at the Royal College of Music. A pupil of Charles Villers Stanford, Charles Hubert Parry and Charles Wood at the Royal College, he wrote music within the prevailing English tradition, showing some affinity with Vaughan Williams in his choral music.

As an organist by training, Howells added significantly to the repertoire of English organ music, notably in two organ sonatas, four organ rhapsodies (the first of which we hear today), and sets of psalm preludes.

From the late 1930s Howells turned increasingly to choral and organ music, composing a second series of *Psalm Preludes* followed by a set of *Six Pieces* (begun 1939), of which the third, *Master Tallis's Testament*, a particular favorite of the composer's, recalled his formative experience of Vaughan Williams' *Tallis Fantasia*. A set of *Four Anthems*, originally titled *In Time of War, O Pray for the Peace of Jerusalem* and *Like as the Hart*, followed in early 1941.

††**Craig Phillips** is a distinguished and popular American composer and organist. His choral and organ music is heard Sunday by Sunday in churches and cathedrals across the United States, and many of his works have been performed in concert throughout North America, Europe and Asia. Last year, he was named the American Guild of Organists Distinguished Composer for 2012 — the seventeenth recipient of this special award. Dr. Phillips joins an illustrious list that includes past honorees Virgil Thomson, Ned Rorem, Daniel Pinkham, Stephen Paulus, David Hurd and others.

Dr. Phillips holds the degrees Doctor of Musical Arts, Master of Music, and the Performers Certificate from the Eastman School of Music, Rochester, New York, where he studied with the great pedagogue Russell Saunders. His Bachelor of Music Degree is from Oklahoma Baptist University, and his early musical studies were at the Vanderbilt University's Blair School of Music in Nashville with Peter Fyfe, who was also Garrett Martin's first organ teacher at Blair. Dr. Phillips has served as Director of Music at All Saints' Church, Beverly Hills since 2009. He previously served for 20 years as All Saints' Associate Director of Music and Composer-in-Residence.

†††**John Weaver** (born in 1937), is known as one of the America's finest concert organists. From 1970-2005, Weaver served as Director of Music at Madison Avenue Presbyterian Church in New York City. He was Head of the Organ Department at the Curtis Institute of Music in Philadelphia from 1972 to 2003 and Chair of the Organ Department at The Juilliard School from 1987 to 2004. He also contributed extensively to *The Presbyterian Hymnal (USA)* we use in worship each week.

Magna Carta is the charter of liberties that England's King John granted to his barons in 1215. In the centuries since its creation, Magna Carta has become one of the most enduring symbols of liberty and the rule of law. Magna Carta is often cited as one of the founding documents of modern democracy and constitutional government. It is seen as a forerunner of such important sources of the British Constitution as the Petition of Right (1628), Habeas Corpus Act (1679), and English Bill of Rights (1689). The document also had a profound effect on American colonists. The founders of the United States looked to it as a major influence in the creation of the Declaration of Independence, United States Constitution and Bill of Rights.
