




### Worship Times will change on Rally Day, September 11!

The Session approved the motion by the Worship, Music, and Arts Committee to implement the time change beginning Sunday September 11, 2016 - Rally Day - and to monitor how the change is impacting our congregational life on Sunday mornings.

The reason for this change is so that we can conclude the later worship service by 11:30am and to foster a fellowship time after worship at what we are calling "Meet and Mingle."

The "Meet and Mingle" fellowship time will be set up in the Holmes Room so that those leaving the Sanctuary through the pulpit side doors will step into a welcoming, attractive space with excellent refreshments. Our aim is to encourage mingling, connecting, bonding among our members, friends, and visitors who come from 34 zip codes and often only see one another briefly on Sundays. We also want to send folks on their way with the full afternoon to tend to domestic responsibilities, recreational activities, school work - whatever Sunday afternoons usually hold for our diverse membership.

## Notes on Today's Music

\***Stephen P. Schaefer**, a life-long amateur chorister and composer, sang with the WPC Choir from 1984 until 1992, when his relocation to Rochester made it impractical to continue. He recently relocated to Batavia, NY, close enough to make the twice-weekly trip back to Westminster, and rejoined the Choir in January of 2016, and renewed his membership at WPC this past May. Glory Day is the first of his original compositions to be publicly performed.

\*\***Bruce Prince-Joseph** attended the Yale School of Music, the University of Southern California, and held a Fulbright Fellowship to study organ building in Europe. He returned to New York in 1953 to serve on the faculty at Hunter College (CUNY) and was hired as both organist and harpsichordist for the New York Philharmonic. Prince-Joseph is perhaps best known both for his work with Virgil Fox in constructing the organ at Avery Fisher Hall, and for his numerous recordings with the Philharmonic and Leonard Bernstein. He retired to his hometown of Kansas City, and served various churches until his death.
