Notes on Today's Music

'Sir Charles Villiers Stanford, an Anglo-Irish composer, conductor, and teacher, greatly influenced the next generation of British composers; Ralph Vaughan Williams, Sir Arthur Bliss, and Gustav Holst were among his pupils. Stanford studied at Trinity College, Dublin, and Queen's College, Cambridge, and between 1874 and 1877 with Karl Reinecke in Leipzig and Friedrich Kiel in Berlin. He became professor of composition at the Royal College of Music in London in 1883 and professor of music at Cambridge in 1887. He also conducted the London Bach Choir (1885-1902) and the Leeds Triennial Festival orchestra (1901-10). He was knighted in 1901. Stanford was a prolific composer and was especially known for his orchestral works, which include seven symphonies and five Irish Rhapsodies. His other works include numerous choral pieces, 10 operas, and many songs. His music reflects the late 19th-century Romantic style, into which he introduced elements of Irish folk song.

That WPC is home to five Steinway Pianos? These treasured and historic instruments help to support our music and education programs and are in constant use.

Where are they?

- Holmes Chapel / Steinway O 1907
- Case Library / Steinway O 1914
- WECP / Steinway L 1940
- Parish Hall / Steinway L 1954
- Sanctuary / Steinway D 1979

The Steinway D Concert Grand in the Sanctuary was a partial gift from the family of Sarah (Alain) Charlier, whose grandmother was Frina Arschanskaya Boldt. Frina and her sister Zhanna, both talented pianists for the age of six, escaped from a concentration camp, in part, through the clever use of their acclaimed piano playing. Both found success in piano teaching and performance careers.

All WPC pianos receive bi-annual tunings and regulation to maintain their performance sound. The Steinway D, in the Sanctuary, after considerable work in recent years, is recognized as one of the finest concert instruments in Buffalo.

The replacement value of our five instruments would be \$440,000. It is hoped that a small portion of the Capital Campaign funds raised is hoped to be used to rebuild these pianos to enhance and maintain the integrity of these fine instruments for continued daily use and for the generations that will follow.
