Notes on Today's Music

Edgar Leslie Bainton² a British-born, latterly Australian-resident composer was born in Hackney, London in 1880. He won a scholarship to the Royal College of Music in 1896 and he was awarded the Tagore Medal. He was appointed Professor of pianoforte and composition at the Conservatoire of Music in Newcastle upon Tyne in 1901 and became principal in 1912. It sadly closed in 1938, four years after his subsequent emigration to Australia.

He was the conductor of the Newcastle Philharmonic Orchestra between 1911 and 1934. Whilst visiting Germany in 1914 he was caught by the outbreak of war and interned in Ruheben camp with other musicians. He was invalided to The Hague in 1918 before returning to Newcastle.

In 1934 Bainton was appointed Director at the New South Wales State Conservatorium of Music and within a few months had conducted the first concerts of the future Sydney Symphony Orchestra. When he retired the number of students at the NSW State Conservatorium had increased from 750 in 1934 to over 2000 in 1946.

He was a prolific composer of choral, symphonic, and chamber works. Of Edgar Bainton's church music, *And I saw Heaven*, which was completed in June 1928, takes pride of place in keeping his music alive today.

DID YOU KNOW...

It was 116 years ago in 1903, that the Church slate roof was replaced? Our roof and adjoining surfaces are in need of immediate repairs, and sadly, in some instances, replacement. After careful and thorough investigation, under the watchful eye of the Building and Grounds Committee, and it's Chair, Tom Warszawski, Session has approved roof repairs, and as needed, replacements as a top priority.

Also needing immediate attention is our historic Church Spire which houses our Bell. Inspection has found that slate on the spire requires re-pointing and other attention. One of the four finials has tumbled to the ground and the others are severely weekend by age and weather. All four will be repaired and restored.

One only need look up at the Sanctuary ceiling to see how rain and snow have penetrated the worn areas of the slate roof resulting in some portions of the plaster ceiling now requiring interior restoration work. Nothing can be restored on the interior until we have secured our roof.

For this reason, these two exterior projects, both requiring extensive professional scaffolding have been moved to the top of the immediate repairs list and authorized by Session as the first priority of Preserve the Pinnacle Capital Campaign to be launched later this year.

Scaffolding will soon be installed so that work can commence.
