## Notes on Today's Music

At the turn of the century, Ralph Vaughan Williams<sup>†</sup> was among the very first to travel into the countryside to collect folk songs and carols from singers, notating them for future generations to enjoy. As musical editor of *The English Hymnal* he composed several hymn tunes that remain popular (including *Sine Nomine*, "For all the Saints" and *Down Ampney*, "Come down O love Divine" that we sang last week in worship). A long and deep friendship with Gustav Holst was a constructive relationship which was crucial to the development of both composers.

Vaughan Williams took three years off his age in order to volunteer for the army during the 1914-1918 war; after a long period of training and waiting he was sent to France in 1916, serving as a stretcher-bearer in the Royal Army Medical Corps. Later, he was given a commission in the Royal Garrison Artillery and found himself in charge of both guns and horses. The carnage and the loss of close friends such as the composer George Butterworth deeply affected him and influenced his music after the war.

Youthful atheism eventually settled down into cheerful agnosticism. He was widely read, and heavily influenced by poets and writers including Shakespeare, Bunyan, Blake, and Whitman.

Vaughan Williams' ashes are interred in Westminster Abbey, near Purcell. Hardly a musical genre was untouched or failed to be enriched by his work, which included nine symphonies, concertos for piano, violin, oboe and tuba, five operas, chamber, ballet and film music, a large body of songs and song cycles, and various important unaccompanied and orchestral choral works. His orchestral works include such popular favorites as *The Lark Ascending*, *Fantasia on a Theme by Thomas Tallis*, *Five Variants of Dives and Lazarus*, *The Wasps Overture*, and the *English Folk Song Suite*.

*Climate Church, Climate World* by Jim Antal

Rev. 
