Our Big and Little Worlds
Kathleen Kelly, Presenter

Through her work and travel experience, Westminster Elder Kathleen Kelly has a unique understanding of the refugee children she teaches in the Buffalo Public School System. She will talk about how understanding their frames of reference can help us in our spiritual journey.

We are often entering microverses, such as in traveling from one school or house of worship to another. There are worlds even contained within one city. People carry their pasts and cultures around within them, for better or for worse. How often do we judge someone before trying to understand their frames of reference? Thoreau said that we can travel without leaving our backyards, and this is as true in the city as it is in the countryside. Each day you can meet people who can give you a fresh perspective. It can be a challenge to be still and really appreciate what is unique in an individual, whether it be a new immigrant or someone you have known for years. We make instinctive judgments of people, and part of that is a survival mechanism—but part of it, too, can prevent us from growing our own psyches through embracing diversity.

Kathleen Kelly grew up in Clarence and is a lifelong member of Westminster. Growing up, she was in Bell Choir and Junior Choir. She received her BA in English with a minor in Art History from SUNY at Buffalo, followed by an MA in English Literature also from UB. After living in Manhattan and working at NYPIRG and Forbes, she returned to Buffalo, where she earned a Certificate in Teaching English with Honors at Buffalo State College. During her 18-year career in Buffalo Public Schools, she earned an MS in Educational

Leadership at Canisius College. After 11 years at Buffalo Academy for Visual and Performing Arts, she moved to International Prep at Grover Cleveland, and during the first year there, she earned an Advanced Certificate in Teaching English to Speakers of Other Languages (TESOL) from Niagara University. Kathleen has traveled through 43 US states as well as Argentina, Chile, Uruguay, three additional Latin American and six European, countries, Hong Kong, and Morocco. After six years as a Deacon, Kathleen now serves Westminster as an Elder.

This year we will explore the 2019–2020 Horizons Bible study, *Love Carved in Stone: A Fresh Look at the Ten Commandments*, which examines: How do we live out our relationship with God and with one another in a world that is often ruled by other standards? What is the pain from which God seeks to protect us in the Ten Commandments? How can a fresh embrace of the Ten Commandments contribute to the restoration of ourselves, our communities, and the furthering of the gospel in the world? A message from Roger Seifert, Chair of Capital Campaign





THE ALCOHOL COMMITTEE IS ACTIVE AGAIN!

In 1981 a group of Westminster members formed a committee dedicated to providing information about alcoholism and about treatment facilities in Western New York. The disease of alcoholism, the most common form of drug addiction, afflicted many millions of people, was a huge public health problem, and caused billions of dollars in property damage; and yet it was considered a shameful moral lapse and folks were reluctant to talk about it. We felt that people who wanted advice about alcohol might be more willing to talk to fellow church members than to pastors or to professionals - and we were right. Our research indicated that we were truly pioneering - the first church to offer such a service. Through the next 20 years we provided free and confidential information to many individuals and families, and we conducted presentations at other churches who were interested in what we were doing. Since the turn of the century we have included our names and contact information in church publications, with an open invitation to contact us privately.

Today the opioid crisis has dominated news about addictions, but the grim statistics about alcoholism, and the general lack of information about it, remain. We are resurrecting ourselves, announcing our compassionate expertise to the Westminster community and beyond. We are a group of church members with special knowledge about this terrible disease.

We are available 24/7 to offer free and absolutely confidential information - about the disease, about the terrible toll it takes on both the drinker and those close to him/her, about local assessment and treatment programs, and about Alcoholics Anonymous. Look for announcements of presentations and programs by us.



that supplies water for the city of Buffalo.**



Meet with Westminster friends at the Buffalo Maritime Heritage Festival taking place inside and around the historic Col. Ward Pumping Station located just off the 190 at 2 Porter Avenue.

Outside the Pumping Station will be food trucks (Fat Bob's Smokehouse, Rudy's Kitchen, The Great Aussie Bite Food Truck), a beer tent with local brews (+special event brown ale created by Pressure Drop Brewery) antique and classic boats, music, and activities for kids like model boat races and the chance to meet a real draft horse.

Inside the Pumping Station will be vendors selling arts and antiques along the balcony surrounding the largest collection of vertical, triple expansion, steam pump engines in the world! Expect spectacular up-close views of these industrial steam pumps towering nearly five stories high! The Colonel Ward Pumping Station is accessible by wheel chair or scooter.

All outside events are free and open to the public. Tours and the artisan market inside the Col. Ward Pumping Station will have a \$10 registration fee. Parking for the festival will be off DAR Drive (turn left off Porter Ave)

in the Centennial Pool Lot, along the roads and other lots inside LaSalle Park, along Porter Avenue (pay attention to city signs). Overflow parking will be across the street down Rotary Row in the lots outside the Buffalo State Center. DO NOT park inside the Buffalo Yacht Club.
